Recalling the Wild (En 101)

This is a new course, designed to investigate ideas about wilderness and "the wild" as they connect to our own sense of humanity. I have structured it as a survey in three parts, where the concept of the wild is considered first of all in terms of nature and the environment, then in terms of animals, and finally with reference to the human. With just one or two exceptions, we will be focusing or discussions on a time period (the nineteenth century through the present) when increasing population rise, exploration, and industrialization seem to push questions of the wild to the margins of human society and culture. Part of the project of the course is for us to determine, to what degree that might be true, and to what degree notions of wildness are transformed and reintegrated into the human condition in different ways. At the end of the quarter we will consider the "final frontier" with a short reflection on the wild alien.

Note: This is a preliminary syllabus and slight changes may occur before the first week of the quarter, but there will not be an increase in the workload. All readings will be available as pdfs on Canvas.
