

Hum/En 25 The Human Animal, Preliminary syllabus for spring 2023
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This course asks a simple question: what makes humans different from (all other) animals? We will look at various responses to this question and develop our own perspectives through readings from the Middle Ages through the twentieth century: the era when ideas such as the animal soul and animal rights were increasingly debated. Literary examples from this historical time period will be coupled with more contemporary philosophical perspectives. We will also devote some class time to working on basic challenges of the writing process, from taking notes and forming an outline, to creating an argument and developing a style of writing.

Course requirements:

- In-class attendance
- Perusall comments (this is a collaborative pdf annotation app)
- Homework assignments (two, around 1,000 words each)
- Final project (individual or collaborative; this will have a presentation and essay component)
