Overview:

If you ask a psychologist, a poet, a theologian, and a philosopher to define what a dream is from their point of view, and also ask them to explain why dreams are important to human life, you will receive very different answers. In this course, we investigate how dreams have been narrated and interpreted at various moments in history and from different disciplinary perspectives. We will take a close look at the language of dream visions as well as their symbols and structure, and think about the distinctions between dreams, delirium, and other kinds of visions. We will also consider the ways dreams have been used as metaphors to question the foundations of our knowledge and our perception of reality.

Goals & objectives

In this class, you will:

- improve your reading, writing, and analytical skills with feedback from both me and your peers
- learn how literature intersects with other fields, such as the history of psychology and religion
- see how different literary genres approach the topic of dreaming in different ways and become comfortable working with historical sources
- develop your own ideas about why dream narratives are fundamental to human culture!
