Course Description: This course offers an introduction to masterpieces of 17th and 18th century French literature. We will focus on major plays by Molière (*The Misanthrope* and *Tartuffe*) and Marivaux (*The Game of Love and Chance*), and on novels by Crébillon fils (excerpts from *The Wayward Head and Heart*), Vivant Denon (*No Tomorrow*), and Choderlos de Laclos (*Dangerous Liaisons*). We'll be reflecting on the function of comic theater as a satirical tool for policing behavior in seventeeth-century France, on the emergence of the novel as a new, flexible means of psychological exploration and character development, and on the way all of these works portray the tensions between the social "rules of the game" and the desires and freedom of the modern individual. Throughout we will also be thinking about how relevant these works remain to our twenty-first century lives, especially in their depiction of the anxieties and maneuvers attending love and courtship. All readings are in English but students may read the texts in French if they would like.
