Fall 2013 PA 70a Questionable Literature: Literature of the Offensive

3 units (2-0-1)

Course Description:

This is a course in literature not commonly taught in a typical English course primarily due to the questionable content contained within each novel. Excerpts will be taken from the following books: *The Sound and the Fury*, Oedipus Rex*, Lolita*, They Called Themselves the KKK, Uncle Tom's Cabin*, Gone with the Wind*, Adventures of Huckleberry Finn*, Ain't I a woman, Raising Boys Feminists will Hate, Feminists Say the Darndest Things, 50 Shades of Grey* and The Perks of Being a Wallflower*. The course is 3 units and structured with 2 x 1-hour lecture and discussion sections each week, and 1 hour of reading and preparation for the weekly classes.*

When the midterm prompts are given out, there will be some short instruction on the mechanics of writing papers that do not follow the generic five paragraph essay format. This includes, but is not limited to: making a useful outline before beginning to write and recognizing awkward sentence constructions.

Classes, Homework, and Grading:

A passing grade is considered 75% of total points

Since the Discussion is an integral and fun part of the class, only 2 classes can be missed without grade deduction. The midterm essay will be a 1.5-2 page paper (minimum 400 words) on topics relating to units 1 and 2 of the course. The final essay will be a 2-page paper (minimum 500 words) relating to units 3 and 4 that will be due on the last week of class. The topics will be diverse enough to allow students to explore any aspect of the course that interests them without worrying about topic approval.
