Goals

This course has two primary goals: (1) to learn how to appreciate and understand poetry and (2) to understand some of the innovations of modernist poetry.

Requirements and Procedures

You must write four papers, each approximately 1000 words long; they are due on January 19, February 2, February 23, and March 17. Please send the papers to me as email attachments, preferably in Microsoft Word format; name the files with your surname and the number of the paper (e.g. smith1.doc). You will also be responsible for reading aloud and presenting poems to the class. By the end of the term you must recite to the class a poem that you have memorized. Finally, you must choose a word from one of the poems assigned each week and use the *Oxford English Dictionary* (https://clsproxy.library.caltech.edu/login?url=http://dictionary.oed.com/entrance.dtl) to explain its meaning in context; send me a paragraph by email before the beginning of class.

Two-thirds of your grade will be based on the papers, and the other third on class participation and the weekly paragraphs using the *OED*. You must receive a passing grade on all of the papers to pass the class.

Please do not bring laptop computers to class.
