Aims: We will read and discuss a range of literary works produced by English writers from the period known as the Renaissance through the Victorian period, paying special attention throughout to the generic qualities of these works. What kinds of expectations are meant to be raised in readers' minds as they read a tragedy? A lyric poem? A romance? An essay? We might broadly say that each genre projects a particular worldview, and that at the point where the reader's imaginative efforts meet the author's, new imaginative realities unfold. These realities live in the minds of readers as they read, and we will spend our time this quarter exploring them as fully as we can.

Requirements: Three essays: two shorter ones focused on close readings of an assigned work, and a final longer one that will present a thesis dealing with two of the works we will have read during the term. There will also be a number of take-home assignments on various readings, due in class on the day we will discuss those readings. The essays will count for two-thirds of your final grade for the course; the other assignments and class participation will account for the other third.
